- A. Sum up all of your justifications
- B. Refute the other side yet again.
- C. End in a persuasive flourish. ←

State your opponent's viewpoint here. Make sure what you use here is something you can easily refute. We want to make the other side look bad early and often. "Some Americans might say race relations in this country are fine, but they are ignoring the real truth..."

Always end your introduction with a thesis that outline the THREE main points you wish to discuss in your essay; these will become the three justifications of your thesis, and thus your next three paragraphs. NOTE: Three is not an arbitrary number, but usually less options makes for a weaker argument, and more makes for too many for your readers. See me if your idea uses a number different than three.

Each of your justification paragraphs is going to be one of the main points you've outlined in your thesis. Write your first one here. And follow a similar pattern for your second and third points.

After finishing your rough outline, leave spaces in here to write in your note card numbers. As you find information about your topic, you can easily add those numbers here and lend support to your argument. Remember: The more official support and data you have to support your ideas, the stronger your argument will be.

Example: Although racial gaps in pay is evident throughout America and furthers poor race relations, it is the current bias in our legal system, which consistently singles out minorities, that is truly to blame for the lack of inequality in our modern society.

How do you end it? With a "Call to Arms"! Tell people how they can lead the charge and help promote your cause. Be so convincing that you make people want to rise up against all who oppose you.
